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WAITING ON GOD FOR YOUR APPOINTED TIME

Saul was tired of waiting. The physical realities around him placed a demand for him to do something. The enemy continued to gain strength and advantage over his army. Worse still, many of his men were deserting him, choosing to escape from the looming force of the boisterous enemy. He was eager to engage the enemy but remained restrained because he had been commanded to wait seven days for Samuel the Seer to come and offer sacrifice unto the LORD. That was the LORD's requirement before Israel would engage in the war. It was easy to wait the first day and the next. But as the days passed, the situation on the ground put him in a dilemma; the more he delayed, the more he lost the respect of his men and the threat from the enemy. It was now seven days, and Samuel was nowhere in sight. His patience had run out. He had the urge not to wait anymore for Samuel but to offer the sacrifice himself.

So Saul said, "Bring a burnt offering and peace offerings here to me." And he offered the burnt offering. (1 Samuel 13:9)

We are not immune from the realities that confronted Saul: situations that challenge our faith and ability to wait on God. These realities will cause us to question our beliefs and challenge our faith in God. Also, with Saul, there was a time demand for him to wait, whereas Abraham believed in God in the face of his realities, where God did not put time

into the intervention. As it were, the trial or testing of our faith often puts us in an emergency default where our minds go free of options to escape the challenge. And when we do take an escape option, we justify it with thoughts like, 'Just this once' or 'I'll ask God for forgiveness.'

"I say then: Walk in the Spirit, and you shall not fulfill the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusts against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; and these are contrary to one another, so that you do not do the things that you wish. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law." (Galatians 5:16-18)

In these moments, we fail to realize the battle against our faith and our ability to stand despite any situation in life. Can God trust you or me to stand and not yield to the realities even where it will take our all from us, just as it did with Job? Do we remain unyielding to the raging storm and not do the contrary as counselled by Apostle Paul in verse 17, "so that you do not do the things that you wish?"

Saul put the flesh above doing the will of God. He walked by sight and yielded to its will. By so doing, he disobeyed God and lost the throne to a more deserving person.



What Are You Waiting For?

Is what you are waiting for worth anything to you? How important is what you are waiting for? Let's be clear about this waiting. It is an expectation of something beyond our reach or ability. Waiting is birthed in the promise of something great beyond man's reach. That is why it takes God to give the promise and not man. Yes, man makes promises, but that promise depends on the promise-giver's mortality. As long as the person is alive, one can hope. But even that hope is suspect in that a man of excellent means to-day can lose all tomorrow.

On the other hand, God is not a man who is so constrained or limited. He is the Beginning and the End, the One who was, is, and is to come. His promise never fails, but His timing far differs from man's. Moreso, He is able to bring His promise to fulfilment, and He is not one who makes empty promises. He does what He says He will do.

"For when God made a promise to Abraham because He could swear by no one greater, He swore by Himself, saying, "Surely blessing I will bless you, and multiplying I will multiply you." (Hebrews 6:13-14)

The LORD who knows, loves, and cares about us through His unfailing promises, gives us a 'future and hope.' This future is beyond our human understanding and





"For what does the Scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness." (Romans 4:3)

This man represents a perfect example of waiting on God; more importantly, he knows what he is waiting for. Do you know what you are waiting for? Let's try and clarify this. Yes, we know that Abraham waited for the promised child, Isaac, and it took 25 years to fulfill that promise. But God's promise to him was much more. It was an eternal promise that exceeded our earthly needs or requirements. And that promise was the hope that kept Abraham going despite the trials and testing of his faith. He obeyed when asked to leave his father's country for a land God would show him. And the book of Hebrews 11:8 says, 'he went out not knowing where he was going.'

But the story of Abraham did not end there. In obeying God, he left the comfort and world he had known and settled in the 'land of promise.' In this land, his cousin chose the best part and left him with 'the worst' before God's intervention. Moreover, Abraham did not live the grand lifestyle he was used to, nor did Isaac and Jacob, for the same book of Hebrews says that they dwelt in tents! Abraham could have abandoned the promise and the promised land and returned to his father's land, but he stayed and waited on God. So did Isaac and Jacob, heirs with him of the same promise. 
"He waited for the city which has foundations, whose builder and maker is God" (Hebrews 11:10)


This was what Saul failed to see. Abraham saw what God wanted him to see; Saul saw what he wanted to see. God taught Abraham how to see, but Saul failed to learn the walk of faith. God would take Abraham out to see the future, but Saul was only interested in the present. Therein lies the difference. One was a man of faith, while the other was a man of the flesh.

What It Means To Wait

To wait on God is to trust Him entirely despite earthly realities or challenges. Any man who chooses to wait on God must be willing to let go of everything and rest in hope. We do not see the troubles, but we see Jesus, the High Priest. As much as we wait on God to fulfill our earthly needs, we must never forget that which is more important: our eternal future in Christ Jesus. God alone knows the appointed time, and we must be careful not to lose like Saul because of his inability to wait until the end. More importantly, we must learn from the 'cloud of witnesses' in the book of Hebrews 11. While some received the promise in their lifetime, some did not but saw that which was more glorious.

I needed an underground water tank and knew precisely how I wanted it constructed, so I gave clear instructions to the builder. The next day when I inspected the project, I was annoyed when I realized that he had failed to carry out my instructions. He had changed the plan and therefore the effect. The excuse he gave was as irritating as his failure to follow my directives.

As I watched him redo the concrete work, and as my frustration diminished, a guilty conviction swept over me: How many times have I needed to redo things in my life in obedience to the Lord? Like the ancient Israelites who frequently failed to do what God asked them to do, we too often go our own way. Yet obedience is a desired result of our deepening relationship with God.

Moses told the people, "Be careful to do what the Lord your God has commanded you... Walk in obedience to all that He has commanded you' (Deuteronomy 5:32-33). Long after Moses, Jesus urged His disciples to trust Him and to love one another.

This is still the kind of surrender of our hearts that leads to our well-being. As the Holy Spirit helps us to obey, it is good to remember that He "works in us to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose" (Philippians 2:13)

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It seems like sooner or later everyone gets mistreated and hurt. Many times the actions against us are unintentional, but other times they can be extremely malicious. Suddenly, this hurt begins to invade every other area of our life. We carry a heavy burden which we know we don't deserve - and which we certainly don't desire to keep - but it's a burden we can't seem to let go.

There is only one true way to relieve the burden of our hurt, and it always begins with forgiveness. True forgiveness can be difficult and require great humility. We want the other person to first ask (maybe even beg) for our forgiveness. We would like them to admit the hurt they caused; and, if we are honest, we probably would prefer them to suffer... just a little. But this is generally not God's plan.

"Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you." (Colossians 3:13)

If we have come to a saving faith in Jesus Christ, we have first come face to face with our sinful nature. Without an understanding that we are full of sin, we will never reach out for a savior. And if we have experienced the true meaning of God's love, "while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8), we will be compelled to reach out and love others. If we truly understand His forgiveness of us, can we really withhold our forgiveness of those who have caused us pain?

Jesus told a parable of a man who failed to forgive a small debt when his master had just forgiven him a much greater debt: "Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' In anger his master turned him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed" (Matthew 18:33-34). Do we really understand how much we have been forgiven, or our inability to repay? Yet our debt has been completely forgiven by grace through faith in Jesus, and we are now commanded to forgive others.


God established the standard for forgiveness. We are not called to forgive because someone deserves or has earned our forgiveness, we are called to forgive simply because God first forgave us. When we forgive, we must strive to make the forgiveness complete; "For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more" (Hebrews 8:12). Though we may carry a healthy level of new caution as the relationship continues, we must never place conditions on maintaining our forgiveness.

There WILL be times when we are burdened with hurt. But let's not seek revenge or try to withdraw and hide our pain. Let's follow the commands of God's Word and be set free! Let's grow closer to our Heavenly Father and see through His eyes. Let's share His love and forgive as He forgave.

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

Jeremiah said-


Jeremiah 15:16 KJV

What you sow, you will also reap.


Be consistently fair to others.

The measure you judge, so shall it be measured back unto you.


